Our 410E "Making A Real Difference" service journey continues in March with an Environment month focusing on the Conservation of our Natural Resources in support of:


- World Wildlife Day on 3<sup>rd</sup> March (Thursday)

The theme of World Wildlife Day 2022 is "Recovering key species for ecosystem restoration". According to figures by the International Union for Conservation of Nature's Red List of Threatened Species, over 8,400 species of wild fauna and flora are critically endangered, while close to 30,000 more are understood to be endangered or vulnerable. Based on these estimates, it is suggested that over a million species are threatened with extinction.



We have the power to change course and restore threatened species and their habitats. As Lions let us help chart a path towards a sustainable future, with the goal of living in harmony with nature.

# IF YOU EVER DOUBTED THE IMPORTANCE OF LIONS ALERT IN YOUR CLUB



## **MAMELODI FLASH FLOOD 5 FEBRUARY 2022**

Please take the time to read this incredible act of Service from the Heart, and the importance of Lions Alert.





During the night of Friday the 4<sup>th</sup> of February 2022, the Pienaar River came down in flood and destroyed or badly damaged shacks in Mamelodi. Over 700 people were displaced and evacuated to the Mamelodi West and Nellmaphius Halls by the Tshwane Disaster Management Centre. Others were also relocated to the Trans Oranje Hall and in Hammanskraal.

## THE PULSE

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Lion Owen from the Lions Club of Pretoria South and who lives close to the flooded area, reported the destruction on the Lions Club of Pretoria South WhatsApp group. Lion David reported it as well from what the information he had received on social media. Following these alerts, Lion David put out a request for pledges for funds to assist those in need. Within a short period of time, R9 900 was pledged by Members and Friends of the Lions Club of Pretoria South.







Lion Theo, as the Lions Club of Pretoria South Alert Coordinator, met with Lion Owen in Mamelodi to assess the damage and meet with the residents at the Nellmaphius Hall. They were able to establish who the main individuals were that were managing the Centre together with the local Councillor. Their immediate plea was for food as most people had not eaten since the evening before. The Lions Club of Pretoria South were able to deliver 100 x 500g TRRC Nutrition packs of cereal (500 meals and suitable for children from 6 months), for immediate consumption plus 200 bowls and 100 plastic containers as well as 200 spoons to utilize to serve the meals. Whilst the displaced persons had access to toilets there was no toilet paper which was soon remedied by purchasing a bag of 48 toilet rolls and dropped off at the facility.





Further needs that were identified was for matrasses, blankets, baby formula, clothing, toiletries, sanitary pads. Once again the Lions Club of Pretoria South sprang into action.

A recent visitor to the Club was Cllr Cindy Billson from Centurion who also sits on the Tshwane Disaster Management Team serving on the social responsibility committee and Lions Gizella, David and Cllr Cindy put together a team of volunteers to make sandwiches at the Wierda Park Reformed Church, whilst a pot a veggie soup was on the go.



By the afternoon of Saturday, the 5<sup>th</sup> of February, the community had supplied a 4-burner gas cooker and 2 large and 1 smaller 9kg gas bottles to the Nellmaphius Hall. This was invaluable as Lions Gizella and David brought sandwiches and a pot of soup for immediate consumption as well as 350kg of fresh veggies donated by Eat Your Greens to the Nellmaphius Hall, where 250 people had registered for support. Three cooking pots were also "loaned" to help get things going. Through the local Councilor's some of the food donated by other donors and sandwiches were also taken to the Mamelodi West Hall.

On Saturday afternoon, Lion Theo was called to the Tshwane Disaster Management Centre for a quick briefing and to meet the Disaster Management Team. This proved to be incredibly helpful firstly to meet with them and get a clear understanding how they operate. Until then Lion Theo wasn't aware of their existence as until then, the presumption was that Disaster Management was covered by the Fire Department, EMS, TMPD, Health Department, etc. as separate entities. This team took control and despatched/managed the operation utilising the abovementioned departments to carry out the necessary work within their specialized areas. They had been in action since the evening of the 4th of February during the height of the floods. (More under lessons learnt.) They also explained that matrasses and blankets were being delivered on Saturday the 5<sup>th</sup> of February during the evening to the 5 centres (sadly, 1 centre was later excluded from operations as they looted the truck delivering supplies). The initial delivery turned out to be very short of supplies, as the numbers in need had swelled from 250 to 700 at the Nellmaphius Hall and 70 to 170 at the Mamelodi West Hall by Sunday, 6th February. As such, more matrasses and blankets were delivered.





On Saturday, 5<sup>th</sup> February during the evening Lion Theo received a call from Executive Mayor Randall Williams' assistant advising that the Executive Mayor was about to enter the Nellmaphius Hall and was hoping to thank the Lions Club of Pretoria South for what we had done so far, with special reference to the quick reaction to the needs of the flood victims. Unfortunately, the Lions of Pretoria South had already left the facility and were preparing for the next day. Executive Mayor Randal Williams will be visiting the Club on the 1st of March to personally thank the Lions.












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Sunday morning dawned with a meeting at the Tshwane Disaster Management Centre with a recap of where they currently stood with the increased numbers. It was at this point that the Disaster Management Team handed over to the Social Department.

As per the list of needs, "red" was what had been delivered and "black" was what was still needed – food, toiletries, sanitary, baby food and nappies, cleaning materials.



Sunday saw Lion Gerrit and Lions Lady Rita assisting at the Wierda Park Reformed Church together with Lion President Suzette (Lions Club of Centurion) and 2 Friends packing donated clothes and kitchen items (including much needed plates and bowls).

These were delivered to the Nellmaphius Hall on Sunday mid-day. By then Gift of the Givers, Not In My Name, Churches and Shoprite Checkers were delivering much needed supplies as well. Lists of needs were obtained from the Nellmaphius and Mamelodi West Halls. Many of the items were bought on Monday and delivered to the Halls. Gas for the cooking became a new urgent necessity. 9Kg bottles were refilled at both Halls.



Lion Lord and the owners of Little Varsity Nursery were hard at work making pots of mash and soya mince. The community at the Mamelodi Hall were very grateful for this loving gesture.



Friends of Anthony (Little Varsity Nursery) also donated 50 Ladies packs and clothes to the Mamelodi hall "residents". The 23 people at the Trans Oranje Hall were supplied with sandwiches and 20 kg mielie meal.

Lion Theo's experience is that all the donations have been used on site, handed out to the people housed at the Halls and stored and controlled by the kitchen staff who are members of those within the community, displaced by the floods, who put their hands up to do what needs doing – feed 100's of fellow community members, clean the toilets and sweep the Halls.



Monday evening, the 7<sup>th</sup> of February, Lions Theo and Owen delivered sanitary pads, Vaseline, toothbrushes and toothpaste, bathing soap and baby's nappies to the two Halls. R9 900 does not go very far when trying to provide for over 700 people but it sure makes a big difference in their lives. The Lions were always well received by the residents at the Halls and recognised – "The Lions are here" was often heard.



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In the meantime, Lion Theo had made an application to the Multiple District for a R10 000 grant from the Louis Volk Disaster Relief Fund. These monies came through later during the course of the week which was utilized to purchase of cleaning materials, soap for washing clothes and replace the "loaned" pots that we are clearly not going to get back as they are working 24/7.

The Tshwane Council have extended their assistance at the Mamelodi and Nellmaphius Halls until the end February. This then begs the question, "then what?" - The people living in shacks along the Pienaar's River are constantly at risk living within the flood zone. Whilst this is a political hot potato for the Tshwane City Council, it was a humanitarian catastrophe and Lions were able to spring into action and give aid to our fellow Community members because "**We Serve**"

### **Lessons Learnt:**

- There is a Disaster Management Centre in Tshwane, and we need to be in contact with them more often. I will be sharing this information at our next Zone meeting.
- The cleaning materials can go a lot further if we supply 25L containers for the concentrates to be diluted and mixed properly.
- Who is looking after the Emergency Services personnel?
   Here is an opportunity to serve in a different way.
- 4. Lion Theo had not applied for a Louis Volk Disaster Relief grant before, and this could have been done quicker if he was familiar with the process and forms. Is a WhatsApp application acceptable? The application form is in PDF and needs to be printed, signed, scanned and sent. A problem if you don't have a printer at home.
- The Council is able to provide matrasses and blankets beyond our budget.
- 6. Many different organisations provide aid.
- 7. The Council is steering a freight liner, Lions are on jet skis and can run around a lot quicker.
- 8. We can and DO make a difference, however small we might think it is.

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### **NEWSFLASH - NEW LEO CLUB**


Herewith an extract from the letter received from Lions Clubs International:

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It is also important to **choose the right LEO Club Advisor** as this will ensure the success of your LEO Club. When selecting your LEO Club Advisor, consider appointing someone who:

- Enjoys and is interested in working with young people.
- Is flexible and open to new ideas.
- Has the time and ability to attend all LEO Club meetings and training when needed.
- Is able to establish a positive, cooperative relationship with young people.



### Continue the journey from LEO to Lion

It is also the LEO Club Advisor's job to encourage a relationship between the LEOs and the Lions Club as the liaison between Clubs. LEOs are a great source for potential members of a Lions Club, and Advisors are responsible for presenting LEOs with Lions membership opportunities once they are ready for their next step on the journey of community service.

### 18 March - Global Recycling Day



Global Recycling Day falls on March 18<sup>th</sup> each year and aims to promote the vitality of recycling across the globe. It is a day for action, for the world to come together to put the planet first, and to change the mind-set of governments, businesses, communities and individuals around the world, to see recyclables as a resource.



### **Ecobricks**

Ecobricking is what is known as "plastic sequestering". Unlike straightforward recycling, ecobricking is hands-on. It can't be outsourced.

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If as an individual you are worried about the amount of thin plastic film or cellophane coming into your home that you know will end up degrading in a landfill, then start shoving the wicked little scraps through a bottleneck with a stick yourself. It's a tedious enough process to make anyone want to stop bringing home anything wrapped in plastic that should be available without the plastic, making ecobricking a way to monitor your own progress towards waste reduction.





22 March - World Water Day



The purpose of World Water Day and National Water Week is to celebrate water and raise awareness of the 2.2 billion people living without access to safe water. Without it, we cannot survive. The international theme for this year is Groundwater: Making the Invisible Visible.



Groundwater is the water that is in the soil beneath our feet. When it rains, some of the water runs into rivers, but most of the water sinks into the soil. From here, it journeys through the soil and around the rocks. Groundwater is a very important source of water - it provides almost half of all drinking water worldwide.



Whilst not every Club is in the position to provide boreholes to the communities we serve, we can do our bit to preserve the water sources at our disposal, i.e. streams, rivers, lakes, lagoons & estuaries. Every year 11 billion kgs of trash enter the oceans via rivers. The time to clean rivers is now. Together we can make rivers plastic free again.

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Plan a cleanup near you to change this dire situation, involving the communities who make use of the water. Contact your local Town or City council to assist with the removal of the rubbish collected.

### 26 March - Earth Hour



Every year millions of people worldwide participate in a **global event to raise awareness** about climate change and saving energy. The event is known as **Earth hour day**. All who participate switch off lights in their homes and workplaces for one hour. **Now, the Earth Hour 2022 event is here.** 



We live on a beautiful and unique planet. It's the only planet in the universe that supports life. But human activities are now putting our planet in danger.



Earth Hour was first proposed by WWF in Sydney in 2007. The event involved the simple act of turning off lights for one hour. Around 2.2 million people and 2000 businesses participated in the first Earth Hour event.



In 2008, Earth hour was celebrated in 35 countries spanning 400 cities around the world. Important world monuments like Empire State (New York, USA), Golden Gate Bridge (San Francisco, USA), Sydney Opera House (Sydney, Australia), Roman Coliseum (Rome, Italy) also joined the campaign.



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


By 2018,a decade after the first Earth hour celebration, 187 different countries began participating in the campaign. More than 12,000 monuments turned off their lights showing support for Earth hour.

# DISTRICT 410E FINANCE COMMITTEE

## Why?

The Finance Committee was first introduced in 1992 with the purpose of assisting and advising the District Governor and the Cabinet in matters financial. Whilst not a decision-making Committee, it makes recommendations to the District Governor and Cabinet Members.



## Compilation of the Committee?

The District Governor Elect appoints a Chairperson, and they (District Governor and Finance Committee Chairperson) jointly appoint the rest of the Committee, which consists of a minimum of 5 members, 3 all of whom must be Past District Governors and/or Past Cabinet Treasurers. The immediate Past District Treasurer automatically serves for 1 year after leaving office. The District Governor and the Cabinet Secretary serve as executive non-voting members.



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


### **Duties?**

The Committee is charged with reviewing the Cabinet Treasurers Quarterly and Annual Financials, the Budget, and reports with the view of streamlining the financials before making recommendations to the Cabinet.



The Rules of Audit fall within the duties of this Committee, who once again make recommendations to the Cabinet.



During the course of a fiscal year, matters concerning the disbursement of District Funds are referred to the Finance Committee by the District Governor and Cabinet for investigation and recommendation.



# WHY SUCCESSION PLANNING IS IMPORTANT



As we as Lions Clubs approach the time when we will be electing new Club Officers to lead our Clubs, some thoughts around the importance of succession planning.

### Succession Planning Is a GRIND - If we do it the old way



## Try shifting from Succession Planning to Talent Development, because that is exactly what it is!

It's not about putting together a state, it's about pulling together people into a Club Communty – this strategy has been known to revitalize organisations.

- Change the vernacular Shift from "Nominations Committee" to "Talent Council".
- Change from "Nominating Committee Chairperson" to "Chief Talent Scout".
- Recruit a Team of Scouts who connect people with all the different ways, big and small to get involved.
- Everyone involved in Club Leadership should be Scouts.



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### How can Leadership help their Clubs?

- Be an active partner in recruiting members to serve on Club Boards. When you are welcoming or onboarding a new member, or when you are talking to a member at a Club or Conference, say to them: "Have you looked at your local Club? Have you looked at the Leadership? Do you know the President? If not, can I facilitate an introduction?"
- Ask District Leaders to recruit colleagues or employees in their companies to join Clubs and to sit on the Boards. They could make it part of their professional development plan.
- Make a personal introduction of a potential leader to a current Club leader. Be a matchmaker!
- Make volunteering more compelling and attractive. Don't talk about the titles that need filling, instead talk about the opportunity for them to be part of a really vibrant community.
- Assist Club leaders to think about the excitement that a volunteer role produces in their lives – something they can share with others?
- Help Club leaders' practice "the ask". Teach members how to frame the conversation about volunteering, how to invite someone to volunteer and how to follow up on that conversation.



### The blossoming of a new Club volunteer


- Engage the new member and bring them into the Club community.
- Connect them to a person, resource or activity.
- Orientate them to what they need to know to be successful in their new role. Asist them in setting goals. Establish expectations and metrics for success.



- Monitor their work. Check in regularly with them, give them gentle reminders if necessary and always keep them in the loop.
- Mentor and coach volunteers in their new roles.
- Recognise and reward them appropriately.
- Always give and get feedback.
