Objectives set for fiscal year 2022/2023:

As we are all part of the Global organisation, we set **7 objectives** for the year in line with the 5 identified Service pillars and these are.....





 Coordinate a District-wide Service Campaign for Sight in October 2022 and encourage clubs in the District to do a Sight project in that month.



 Coordinate a District-wide Service Campaign for Hunger Alleviation throughout the year and encourage Clubs in the District to do Hunger Alleviation projects. (World Hunger Day/Month – May 2023)



 Coordinate a District-wide Service Campaign for Environment in September 2022, March 2023, and June 2023, and encourage Clubs in the District to do an Environment project.



 Coordinate a District-wide Service Campaign for Diabetes in November 2022 and encourage Clubs in the District to do a Diabetes project in that month.



 Coordinate a District-wide Service Campaign for Childhood Cancer in September 2022 and February 2023 and encourage Clubs in the District to do a Childhood Cancer project in these months.



• Encourage Clubs in the same area/zone to work together to collaborate on their service projects to maximize the impact in their communities.



 Put out a regular newsletter to update all Clubs as to the current status of the District in terms of the Service Goals as well as upcoming Service events. This will also be included in the District 410E Newsletter, The Team Works.

RAISING FUNDS FOR THE CLUB ADMIN ACCOUNT

(As per LCI & presentation circulated by DC GLT, Delphine Ferreira)



As Clubs we all need funds to boost our admin accounts, however as per the Purposes: "We shall encourage service minded people to serve their community without personal financial reward." Our Ethics: "We shall give freely of our time, labour and means."



We Serve
However, please take note of the presentation circulated to all Clubs by DC Delphine. Herewith a summary:



Why have these rules in place?

- Assists Clubs to do the right thing.
- Ensures compliance within the regulations.
- Prevents any misunderstanding & protects the image of our brand (LIONS).
- Helps Clubs fund raise with confidence.



What we may not do?

- Donate or support projects that would benefit any Lion, Lions Club, District, Multiple District or International, financially, or materially.
- No monies raised from the general public may be utilised for administration purposes.



Now Begs the question - how do we legally raise funds for our admin account?

- Host "in-house" fundraising activities within Clubs.
- Friends and family who support Lions may be invited to support "in-house" fundraisers provided they have been advised as to where the funds raised are going i.e., Admin Account.
- Unsolicited donations to club administration may be accepted.
- Funds raised from Tail Twisting at meetings.
- Club Meeting Raffles.
- Rebates on Christmas Cakes is allowed.
- The proceeds from letting Lion's facilities (Club Houses) and payment of services of members or Club may be used to credit the admin account provided that, the amenities and services were not publicly advertised and that those people renting the facilities and paying for services are fully aware that the proceeds will not benefit the community.

 If members who legitimately undertake work at the Club e.g., Clubhouse repairs that would have been otherwise outsourced and paid and then voluntarily donate the remuneration back to the Club.

LOOKING AFTER OUR ENVIRONMENT

National Arbor Week – 29 August – 4 September 2022 South Africa celebrates Arbor Week in the first week of September annually. The Department of Forestry, Fisheries, and the Environment, as the custodian of forestry in South Africa, is responsible for the campaign.

September is also heritage month and as we celebrate Arbor Week, the department also focuses on the country's champion trees which include some of the oldest, largest, and culturally significant trees. These include the Sophia Town Oak Tree and the Sagole Baobab Tree in Limpopo, which are part of our heritage.



Common Tree of the year: *Dais Continifolia*, Pompom Tree (NB: not to be confused with the pompom weed!)



Rare (Uncommon) Tree of the year: *Peltophorum Africanum*, African Wattle

National Arbor Week can also be utilized for greening projects such as planting veggie gardens in an economical and sustainable way by making use of Eco-Circle gardening.



The Eco-Circle gardening method not only saves on labour, but also provides a unique and simple way for growing large volumes of food in small spaces, using very little water. "Eco-circles" build soil fertility and help to prevent the unnecessary loss of soil to the erosive forces of wind and rain. This is achieved by digging a knee-deep hole 1 metre in diameter, and then placing a 2L plastic bottle with vertical holes along the side in the middle. The hole is then filled with alternate layers of compost and subsoil, watering each two layers thoroughly before adding the next.

By adding organic matter and watering each level in turn a sponge effect is created which will retain water below the surface so that plant roots are encouraged to grow deeper, resulting in stronger and better vegetables. Once you fill the bottle with water, it only needs to be refilled once a week if the bed is well mulched. This means that you are using only 2 litres of water per-bed-per- week. Detailed instructions to create an eco-circle will be uploaded on the Environment page of the District 410E website.

International Coastal Cleanup Day - 17 September 2022 International Coastal Clean-up (ICC) Day 2022 is set for September 17 this year, as the world continues to grapple with the growing problem of marine and plastics pollution.

ICC has seen the mobilisation of people the world over to remove trash from beaches and waterways for more than 35 years. Since inception, more than 17 million volunteers from more than 150 countries have collected over 158 million kilograms of trash.



Marine litter and plastics pollution remain a clear and present danger, putting not only human health but also the health of the world's oceans and seas in jeopardy.

"Despite current initiatives and efforts, the amount of plastics in the oceans has been estimated to be around 75-199 million tons. Under a business-as-usual scenario and in the absence of necessary interventions, the amount of plastic waste entering aquatic ecosystems could nearly triple from some 9 -14 million tons per year in 2016 to a projected 23-37 million tons per year by 2040," reveals the 2021 United Nations Environment Programme report, "From Pollution to Solution: A Global Assessment of Marine Litter and Plastic Pollution".



Without interventions by Lions Clubs to do coastal and river clean-ups in conjunction with the plastics recycling companies, our country's waterways will remain clogged with litter, which is eventually washed downstream, ending up in the ocean.

Plant an indigenous tree

If you're looking for a way to add to South Africa's natural heritage, how about planting an indigenous tree? This year, the tree of the year in South Africa is the Dias Cotinifolia otherwise known as the Pom Pom tree. Exotic trees encroach on natural areas and deplete the water table for indigenous plants and trees. Planting local trees helps maintain healthy ecosystems and adds to the biodiversity of our country. You can also plant a hedge of spekbooms which act as a filter to clean our atmosphere. If you live in Limpopo why not take a group of visitors to the giant Sagole Baobab which is deeply rooted in the Venda nation's folklore. The tree is estimated to be over 3000 years old and 43m in diameter at the base of the trunk.



Host a heritage function





Each year the existing hedge will be pruned, and the cutting taken to be used to extend the hedge until it eventually extends around the complete perimeter of the school. Further Spekboom seedlings were planted in the assembly area of the school to further beautify the school.



This event was organized by the South African Dendrological Society (Pilansberg branch) to commemorate the school's 100 years of existence. Members of the Lions Club of Rustenburg, Rustenburg business owners, Fields College, the Voortrekker movement, and members of Dendrological Society were present to plant trees in the schools ARBNET, level 1 international accredited arboretum.

All the trees planted in this arboretum are expected to grow at least a 100 years old. Some of the trees planted were baobab, rooi stinkhout, haardekool, bosvlier, kaapse kastaiing and redivory.


DISTRICT 410E HEALTH PORTFOLIO

WOMENS HEALTH:


- Develop a 1st period package (sani pads, panties, soap, facecloth, sweets in a small bag), in addition to continued efforts to donate sanitary pads to keep girls in school and encourage them to maintain personal healthcare.
- Celebrate Women's Day (8 March international Women's Day and 9 August in South Africa.
- Hand out and wear pink ribbons for breast cancer awareness and support events like Pink Drive Walks.
- Get knitted knockers made and donated to your local breast cancer clinic, together with gently used bras.





MENS HEALTH:

- Like the breast cancer awareness campaigns, join those promoting awareness of testicular cancers e.g., Movember.
- Remind men that they too can develop breast cancer.



HEARING:

- Continue to support folk with hearing loss by assisting getting them tested. The District has many hearing aids but not all programmable.
- Ask retirement homes, funeral parlours to collect aids from folk no longer needing them. These are more likely to be usable.
- Forge a relationship with one or more audiologists in your area.
