



WHENEVER a doubt arises as to the right or ethics of my position or action towards others, to resolve such doubt against myself.


TO HOLD friendship as an end and not a means. To hold that true friendship exists not on account of the service performed by one to another, but that true friendship demands nothing but accepts service in the spirit in which it is given.

ALWAYS to bear in mind my obligations as citizen to my nation, my state and my community, and to give them my unswerving loyalty in word, act, and deed. To give them freely of my time, labor and means.

TO AID others by giving my sympathy to those in distress, my aid to weak, and my substance to the needy.

TO BE CAREFUL with my criticism and liberal with my praise; to build up and

Herewith an insightful explanation that was written by Past International President William L. Woolard (served as International President 1989-1990) for the April 1990 copy of the Lion Magazine.

"As Members of Lions Clubs, we have an obligation to do our very best in meeting the challenges of humanitarian service. We have pledged to give unselfishly of our time and talents in meeting community and human needs, a pledge we must honour unceasingly if we are to feel truly good about our involvement in Lionism.

To live a pure unselfish life, one must count nothing as one's own in the midst of abundance.

In order to maintain pride in our membership and stature as community leaders, we should evaluate regularly what it means to be a part of Lions Clubs International. This, I believe, can best be accomplished by studying periodically our Association's Code of Ethics and recommitting ourselves to the standards of excellence it represents. I have often maintained that our Code is our most important asset as Lions, for it contains the rules which should govern our lives.

The code tells us to recognize the importance of **not** sacrificing our self-respect by taking unfair advantage of others, and that building one's own business does not necessitate tearing down another's. The Code of Ethics teaches us humility and the value of friendship as an end and not a means.

If we follow its simple directives, we will better understand the seriousness of loyalty and good citizenship and the need to give freely of our time and labour. Adhering to these standards will earn us respect in our businesses and professions and demonstrate our capabilities for leadership. Our friends' neighbours, associates, clients, customers, and fellow citizens will know beyond any doubt that Lions can be counted on for honesty, industry, and concern.

The code's seventh component relates directly to our status as service-minded people: 'To aid my fellow men by giving my sympathy to those in distress. my aid to the weak and rny substance to the needy.' This duty, indeed, identifies us as citizens of the world community, as leaders in the cause of humanity. Our commitment means we will never hesitate to do all in our power to help other individuals, whether they live in our own community or halfway around the world. It reminds us that the international programme objectives of the association demonstrate how our responsibilities as Lions extend beyond the borders of our own communities and nations. The unequalled record of service Lions Clubs have established for more than seven decades testifies to the seriousness with which Lions view the commitment to humanitarian concepts they assumed when becoming members.

Finally, the code's eighth directive sums up quite succinctly the personal demeanour required of every individual who is a Lion: 'To be careful with my criticism and liberal with my praise; to build up and not to destroy.' I believe the standards contained in our code are vital to the unbounded dedication of our membership and ultimately to the success Lions Clubs and the entire association experience in meeting service objectives. To further emphasise its impact, during my travels I have observed that many Clubs begin each meeting with a recitation of the code. It is a procedure every Lions Club might consider adopting, if not at each meeting, then perhaps on a monthly or regular basis. If, every Lions Club Member takes the time to study and evaluate the Code of Ethics and determines to put his or her life in conformity with it, that person will most assuredly become a more committed and enthusiastic member of the largest and most active service club organisation in the world.

LCIF STORY

(DC LCIF, Lion Mark van Heerden)



FOUNDATION

The story of LCIF is epic filled with unlimited compassion and tireless support of Lions service. Founded in 1968, the mission of LCIF is to "empower Lions Clubs, volunteers, and partners to improve health and well-being, strengthen communities, and support those in need through humanitarian services and grants that impact lives globally, and encourage peace and international understanding."



LCIF is effectively the engine room of Lions Clubs International. Moneys raised through donations or pledges to LCIF are used to support grants for global events such as major catastrophes, natural disasters, and emergency relief grants around the world as well as to provide various district and clubs community impact grants which enable clubs to service their communities on a much higher scale.

The following **community impact grants** are available:



MATCHING GRANTS

Matching grants (previously called standard grants) are large-scale humanitarian projects that address unmet needs. The project must serve a large population. Grants awarded are between US\$10,000 and US\$100,000. Matching grants typically provide funds for capital construction and equipment. Typical projects include mobile health units, centres for people who are disabled or blind, eye clinics, major medical equipment, nursing homes and schools in developing countries.

SIGHTFIRST GRANTS

SightFirst supports high-quality, cost-effective, equitable, and sustainable eye care projects that focus on infrastructure development, human resource training, eye care service delivery and eye health education. The mission of the SightFirst Grant programme is to develop or improve comprehensive eye care systems to fight blindness and vision loss and to assist people who are blind and visually impaired in underserved communities.

SightFirst Research Grants provide funds to support public health research initiatives that evaluate and directly influence the operation of the SightFirst programme.

DIABETES GRANTS

The LCIF Diabetes Grant Programme can help develop community environments that inspire and support healthy lifestyles and provide education about diabetes and prediabetes. LCIF Diabetes grants can increase access to diabetes care and enhance existing diabetes centers to provide greater service to the community. Diabetes Grants support diabetes youth camps and retreats, diabetes screening activities with comprehensive follow-up care plans, infrastructure and equipment acquisition for existing diabetes care facilities and training of professionals and community diabetes educators. Lions Districts are eligible for grants up to US\$150,000; Lions Multiple Districts are eligible for grants up to US\$250,000.

DISASTER RELIEF GRANTS

When natural disasters strike, Lions are among the first to offer help. With a disaster grant, they can do even more for communities devastated by hurricanes, floods, fires, and other major events. As a foundation, LCIF are proud to offer a variety of grant options to support various stages of disaster relief operations.

Disaster Preparedness Grants support Districts interested in partnering with local authorities and other community organizations to plan and prepare for future relief efforts. Lions' District Governors may submit proposals for Disaster Preparedness Grants. Grants are awarded for up to US\$10,000.

Emergency Grants provide up to US\$10,000 for Districts impacted by a natural disaster. Lions' District Governors may apply for Emergency Grants to help meet immediate needs such as food, water, clothing, and medical supplies. LCIF awards nearly US\$2 million in emergency grant funding each year.

... LCIF LEO SERVICE GRANT

With the support of LCIF, Leos can make a bigger impact in their communities, while being exposed to valuable leadership and life skills. Grants are available to Lions Districts and Multiple Districts in amounts from US\$1,500 to US\$5,000 to address unmet humanitarian needs in their community. Leos must be directly involved in organizing and implementing the project. Successful applications will include a robust hands-on service or volunteer component. In addition, collaboration between Lions and Leos is required for the project. https://www.lionsclubs.org/en/start-ourapproach/grant-types/leo-grants

Examples:

Leos painted, cleaned, and repaired a community centre. Working together, Leos and Lions helped repair the building. The grant supported the purchase of paint, paintbrushes, trash bags, and small repairs in the building.

- Leos built a sensory garden in a playground for people with disabilities. Lions assisted the Leos to obtain necessary permits from local authorities. Leos and Lions did all the labour to establish the garden. The grant supported the purchase of benches, plants, and paving stones
- Leos hosted a dinner for seniors by preparing and distributing meals. Lions supported Leos with fundraising matching funds and managing logistics. Grant funds were used to purchase food, plates, and utensils.

LEO LEADERSHIP GRANT PROGRAMME

This grant provides financial assistance to a Lions Multiple District, Sub-District or Single District interested in organising a Leo leadership conference. Through this grant programme, Leos can expand their leadership skills in the areas of project management, communication, creativity and innovation, teamwork, time management and planning community service projects. Each year, Lions International awards US\$2,000 grants to 24 Lions Multiple Districts, Sub-Districts or Single Districts that are investing in training their Leos. The Leo Club Programme Department reviews applications in the order in which they are received and approves eligible grants based on the content of the application.

.... HUNGER GRANT PROGRAMME

There are nearly one billion people across the world that experience food insecurity. No one can truly understand the devastating physical and emotional impact of hunger unless they experience it. Through the LCIF Hunger Grant Programme, Lions can support school based feeding programmes, food banks, feeding centres, and similar facilities that provide food to people when they need it most. https://www.lionsclubs.org/en/start-ourapproach/grant-types/hunger-grant



Each year more than 300 000 children are


Each year, more than 300,000 children are diagnosed with cancer. Improving childhood cancer survival requires supporting children and their families while they experience the unimaginable social, economic, and emotional burdens of having a child with cancer. Grants are available to Lions Districts and Multiple Districts in amounts from US\$10,000 to US\$150,000. Projects must be implemented in coordination or collaboration with existing government or charitable childhood cancer medical facilities. The grant will not fund medical care directly.

Project examples include but are not limited to:

- Construction, expansion, or renovation of child, teenager, and family-friendly waiting rooms in healthcare facilities.
- Construction, expansion, or renovation of rooms or houses where families can rest, sleep, or cook meals where their child is receiving treatment.



- Projects that strengthen access to or improve transportation to and from medical appointments.
- Projects that address the educational and recreational needs of childhood cancer patients receiving treatment at a healthcare facility.
- Infrastructure to support palliative care.



MD410 LOUIS VOLKS DISASTER RELIEF GRANTS

The objective of the MD410 Louis Volks Disaster Relief Fund is to provide immediate emergency relief assistance to victims of natural or man-made disasters. This is done via the Lions Clubs of Multiple District 410. This assistance is available for relief aid in the aftermath of earthquakes, hailstorms, fires, flooding, drought caused by either natural disasters or as a consequence of man-made disasters e.g. arson.

Relief funds are available to Lions Clubs in amounts not to exceed R10 000 per project and is to be utilised for the distribution of immediate relief aid to victims of serious natural disasters where 50 or more people have been displaced or affected.


The 4th of February is World Cancer Day.



Some other Childhood Cancer project ideas:

- Provide craft materials, puzzles, books & games to children receiving treatment.
- Prepare meals for families with children undergoing treatment.
- Write cards full of well-wishes and share them with a local cancer centre.
- Make or buy new hats, caps, head scarves and blankets to donate to children's cancer centres.
- Coordinate travel arrangements to and from treatments for a family of a child with cancer.
- Provide tutoring services to children with cancer and their siblings.
- Volunteer to assist a family in sharing their story through photography.
- Sponsor an activity day for children with cancer.
- Raise awareness through radio public service announcements or social media campaigns.
- Provide children's entertainment at a hospital or treatment centre for children with cancer.
- Remodel a children's cancer centre.
- Volunteer at a housing facility serving children with cancer.
- Host a wellness and nutrition day advocating healthy living habits for young people.



The 17th of February is Random Acts of Kindness Day, so please use your creativity in making a difference in someone else's life – be it in a big or small way, individually or as a club.



Lions were hard at work selling bacon and egg rolls at the Scottburgh Half Marathon on 14 January.




One of the many people who received eggs from Scottburgh Lions for hunger month – deliveries took place on 23 January.

Lions Club of Klerksdorp




