

Why succession planning is as essential as coffee and cookies



We have stressed the importance of succession planning over the years. The time has come however, to really understand the reason and importance of it in this time where we struggle to grow our organisation, Clubs are recycling Presidents leaving our District with fewer and fewer options for District Cabinet positions and in turn to develop future District Governors.



Let's face it: Succession planning isn't exactly a phrase that gets people jumping out of bed in the morning. It sounds suspiciously like a spy thriller but without the thrilling part. Yet, in our Lions Clubs and, let's be honest, life in general, Long-Range and Succession Planning are as essential as coffee at a 7 a.m. meeting and cookies at...well, any time of day. Here's why.



The "Bob Syndrome": When Your Club is 97% Bob.

It happens slowly at first. "Oh, Bob knows everyone!" "Bob's handled that for years!" But eventually, you realise that your Club's success hinges entirely on Bob, who's now on a first-name basis with his orthopaedic surgeon. When you don't plan for the future, you risk relying on just one person to do everything.






Succession planning to the rescue!



By getting more folks involved, you're not only preparing them to take over one day but also sparing poor Bob the thankless job of managing *every single event* until retirement...or until he finally retires to Durbs to fish in peace.





Not to be dramatic, but eventually, everyone must pass the torch. The current leaders of your Club, while they may have superhero-like endurance, won't be around forever. And neither will you, in whatever you're leading – whether it's a Club, a family gathering, or the company newsletter. Succession planning ensures a smooth, respectful, *less stressful* handover.



Think about it. No one wants to spend their final year with Lions, or any other group being asked, "So… what happens when you leave?" Succession planning is like a giant sticky note for the future, saying: "Don't worry, we got this."



How do we do this?

Ask one person this year to join your Club. If every Lion in our District brings one friend into Lionism, not only will we double our pool of Leaders, but more importantly, we will double our service capacity. If we can improve our service capacity, it will increase the amount of fun we'll be having and make us even prouder to be Lions.

Allow Lions who have not done so before, to take leadership roles. Every Lion is a leader. Not only will you develop that Lion, but you will enrich your Club, our District and expand our impact. If they are hesitant to do so, start with smaller roles, such as leading a committee, planning one event, or running social media. Allow them to develop their leadership skills in a supportive environment.



Motivate your new Lions to attend Leadership Development Workshops offered by our Global Leadership Team. One of the benefits of being a Lion.

You can make a difference. Join me in accepting this challenge, bring a new Lion to our organisation this year and promote a new leader in your Club.

Paying membership dues as a Lion in Lions Clubs International helps keep the organisation strong, effective, and able to fulfil its mission of serving communities worldwide.

HERE'S WHY THOSE DUES ARE IMPORTANT:



SUPPORTING CLUB OPERATIONS

Dues fund the day-to-day operations of your local Club, such as administrative expenses, meeting supplies, communication costs, and sometimes room rentals for meetings. These basic costs are essential for keeping the Club running smoothly.

Whilst membership dues aren't used directly for service projects (since funds raised from the public go toward these efforts), they do allow the Club to be organised and equipped. Your dues support the foundational structure that helps the Club plan and execute its service initiatives effectively.

Meet Alice Hogan and her family. They have been involved with Lions BrightSight since 2003, when our office was still located in Yeoville. Any frames unsuitable for patients are given to the Hogan family and they, in turn, process these frames to extract the metals, which they resell to generate income. Prior to Alice's husband's passing, he would extract the gold & silver to make jewelry for resale, but unfortunately today it's no longer an option for them.





- Work with your local school to invite a health care professional to speak about diabetes.






Post 5: Get Tested and Know Your Status!



The next food delivery by Lions Peter, Stephen and Karen to Osindisweni Orphanage in Hammarsdale on 16 October.





Last pair of spectacles delivered following the vision screening and testing at Angels & Us Day Care Centre on 1 October.




This was a very special day for Oabile's – her 5th birthday. What a gift to receive – when she put her spectacles on she said my cake and presents look so much brighter!





John Bratos, the owner of Bravo Foods has the same enormous generosity that motivates us as Lions - he pulls out every stop to keep the price as low as possible and to ensure each Club benefits. John also offers a R5 rebate per cake to every Club who settles all bills within 35 days of invoice, which is a donation to the Club from Bravo Foods.



The profit on each 1kg cake is a bit over R45 per cake (without considering the R5 rebate) and a bit over R25 for the 500g cake. MD and District projects also benefit from a portion of the profit on each cake, particularly Lions Brightsight.
